Title: Appraisement of that part of the negroes and personal estate of the late Doctor Pasteur which is in Williamsburg, 1791

Physical description: 7.5" x 13"

Scope: On one side of the sheet the individual personal property items are itemized by description and value, and on the other side are the signatures of Gabriel Maupin, James Wood, and Matt Pearson who served as appraisers. Individual slaves are identified and valued by name. One of the slaves, Jemmy, has the distinction of being noted in an advertisement Pasteur posted in the Virginia Gazette and Weekly Advertiser on May 20, 1790.

Note: Dr. William Pasteur was a notable figure in Colonial Williamsburg, establishing his first Williamsburg apothecary shop in 1759, forming a partnership with his Williamsburg competitor, Dr. John Minson Galt, in 1775, and served as mayor of Williamsburg between 1775 and 1776. Pasteur retired from the Pasteur and Galt Apothecary in 1778. In his will, Pasteur empowered his executors to sell his lands in Goochland and all his personal property except for his slaves. He directed the executors to apply the proceeds of the sale to the payment of his debts, gave specific bequests to particular slaves, and left what did not sell, along with a bequest of 500 Pounds, to his wife Elizabeth.

Scope: The Bushrod Washington Family Papers consist of documents gathered by the descendants of the first President of the United States, George Washington. The collection comprises an assortment of correspondence and legal documents, documenting the lives and property ownership of several branches of the Washington family. The collection is organized into five series: Correspondence, Legal Documents, Social, Miscellaneous, and Indenture Notices (Land Deeds).

Note: Bushrod Washington (1762-1829), was the son of John Augustine and Hannah (Bushrod) Washington. John Augustine Washington was the brother of President George Washington. Upon the death of the President, Bushrod Washington inherited the Mount Vernon estate. A graduate of the College of William and Mary, Bushrod Washington would serve as an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. He was joined on the Supreme Court by his long-time friend, John Marshall. Justices Washington and Marshall had met while attending law lectures given by George Wythe at the College of William and Mary. Judge Washington and his wife, Julia Ann Blackburn, had no children of their own, but raised three of their nephews. One nephew, John Augustine Washington, would inherit Mount Vernon from the Judge.

Scope: Cadwalader Evans is writing to Samuel Wharton about Wharton's family that has remained in Philadelphia while Wharton has traveled to London. Much of the discussion focuses on inoculating family members against small pox. Evans is also interested in trying to produce silk near the Ohio River. He also comments on the state of trade in Philadelphia as a result of the trade embargo with England.

separated from the book itself.
